

Key Vocabulary and Definitions

1	<u>Forbidden</u>	Not allowed to do something.
2	<u>Kashrut rules</u>	Judaism's food laws are known as kashrut.
3	<u>Passover</u>	In Judaism, Passover, or Pesach, celebrates the freedom of the Jews from slavery in ancient Egypt. Jews celebrate the holiday of Passover every Spring. The holiday lasts for 8 days and nights.
4	<u>Seder meal</u>	On the first two nights of Passover, a special meal called a Seder is held.
5	<u>Exodus</u>	A departure of a great number of people.
6	<u>Sabbath</u>	A sabbath is a day reserved for rest or prayer, usually each week.
7	<u>Kosher</u>	Food that is prepared according to Jewish laws of food.

1	God asks Jewish people to keep certain rules on what they eat or don't eat.
2	Jews follow Kashrut rules when preparing and eating their food.
3	Jews eat Kosher food.
4	Jewish families have a special meal once a year at the Festival of Passover: the Seder meal.
5	The different items on a Seder plate has different meanings.
6	Jews choose to keep God's requests and rules because they respect God and his authority.

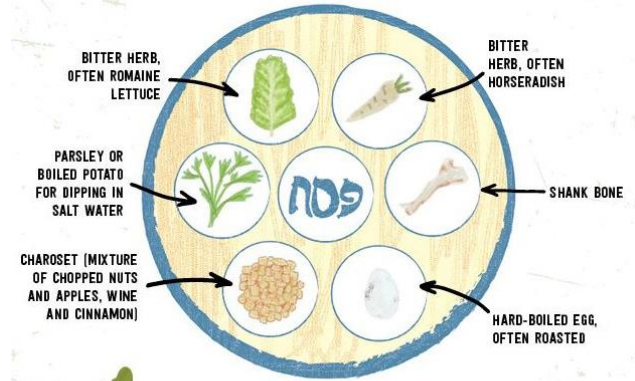
What should I already know?
